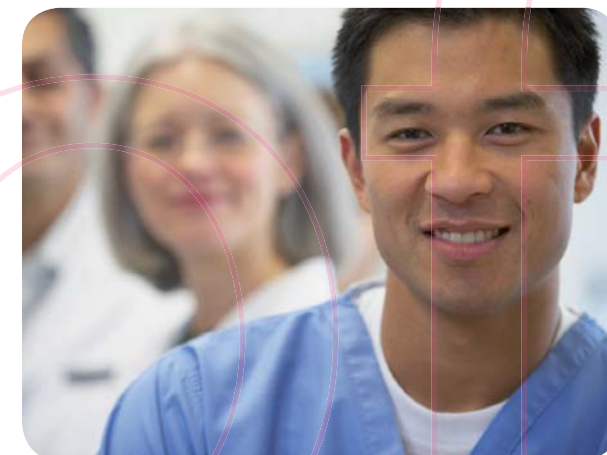

Shortly after starting work as an F1, Doctor A has to go into hospital for a major operation. She's still in hospital recovering when her four weeks sick pay runs out.

Doctor B is killed in an accident, leaving a wife, two small children and unexpected debts. His wife would like to retrain to get back to work and support her family but childcare while retraining is very expensive.

Doctor C is attacked by a patient while working as a locum. She is badly injured physically and the attack also leaves her very depressed. She regretfully decides she needs to consider a non medical career but her financial circumstances mean the cost of retraining without a salary coming in is prohibitive.

Doctor D has restrictions imposed by the GMC and a condition of his return to unsupervised medical practice is that he undertakes an unpaid clinical attachment. He has few financial resources to fall back on.
